

Purpose of Modeling:

The purpose of the Modeling Section in Lesson 2 is two-fold:

1. To demonstrate to students how to conduct a quick review of an Inductee's content page so they are prepared to perform their own quick review on five Inductees during Guided Practice.
2. To show students how to conduct an in-depth review as will be required (on two Inductees) during Independent Practice/Assessment.

Inductee Focus: Dale Lamphere:

Dale Lamphere was intentionally chosen as the focus Inductee in this lesson for several reasons.

- As South Dakota's Artist Laureate – he strives to advocate for the arts, encourage budding artists, and increase appreciation for the arts throughout South Dakota.
- Dale's messages resonate across career paths as he clearly articulates the importance of believing in yourself, taking action, taking chances and committing.
- Dale's artwork is extensive and diverse and the stories behind the creations can be related to any type of career and strive to inspire.

Preparing for the lesson:

- Please review Dale's Legends & Learning page carefully, watching all the videos and reading all the links before presenting the lesson. Notes on important ideas from the DRIVE video are provided to assist you in quickly preparing for the lesson. Use the prepared notes by marking important ideas and of adding your own reflections.

Teaching the lesson:**Quick Review Demonstration:**

1. Explain to students you are continuing the unit on leadership and today they will explore.
2. Explain to students they will choose five Inductees to review in a quick manner. After that quick review, students will choose two of the five Inductees to conduct an in-depth review on.
3. Explain you will first demonstrate how to do a quick review and then an in-depth review.
4. Click on Dale's picture on the Legends & Learning Landing Page
5. Read the biography aloud.
6. Scroll through each section of the presentation; read the headings and short paragraphs and quotes and using think aloud, note interesting elements. At this time, do not watch any videos.
7. Complete one row on the **Quick Review Recording Form**. Explain students will complete all five rows on the form and then will choose two (agreed upon with their partner) Inductees to conduct the in-depth review on during Independent Practice.

In-depth Review Demonstration:

- 1. Click on Dale’s picture on the Legends & Learning Page
- 2. Read the Inductee’s biography aloud.
- 3. Prepare to watch: *Drive: A Profile of Dale Lamphere*

1. Wood Assemblages	Wood assemblages are like building blocks made from wood. Imagine putting together different pieces of wood in fun ways to create art or structures, just like how you might build things with blocks or Legos

Notes taken on DRIVE:

- We need to keep growing as a society and that takes some creativity.
- Dale loved to work with clay – he can remember working with it in nursey school (pre-school).
- Dale lived on ranches in Harding County and then by Sturgis.
- It's important to do something every day!
- On his semester at sea, Dale realized that creating objects that reflect a culture's values and character is a worthwhile endeavor. He decided then that he wanted to spend his days doing this.
- He was very poor as an artist for many years.
- He always worked to do a good job and because of this he kept getting new opportunities.
- Dale is basically a self-taught artist. He started creating art that reflected his life on the ranch and he just kept learning.
- He often agreed to do a project that he didn't know anything about! However, he didn't back out – he just learned about the topic and figured it out!
- Dale's work comes from things he is fascinated by. He is inspired by the environment he has lived in.
- Dale continually does new sorts of creations.
- The way you think can be an asset!
- Dale works to solve problems on a small scale. But there are always things he can't understand until he begins the large-scale projects.
- Dale created Dignity 50 years after he started as an artist.
- Creating is about what he feels at that given moment. Therefore, he believes it's important to keep his attention 'cleaned up' so he can pay attention and grasp those opportunities.
- He always comes back to a creation at the end and finds something he could have done better – and he says – *"I so wish I could have understood that better – but consciousness being what it is – you do the best you can given that point in your understanding – and then later on maybe you understand more and realize that maybe that didn't work so well"* – so that keeps pushing him on because he wants to get it right the next time.
- The break in the middle of the ARC of DREAMS was important to Dale because he knows you can have a dream, an idea in your consciousness and you could take it a certain distance but at some point, it always requires you that trust yourself and the future and take the leap of faith in order to complete the dream.
- All of us have certain a period of time that we get to act out and make manifest of what life can be or what art should be about and then we gradually play out and finish our statement and somebody has to come and take over...so never doubt that you can be that next person to be successful in the arts.
